the Town of Kennebunk of record.

the receipt whereof I do hereby acknowledge, have given, granted, bargained and sold, and by these presents do give, grant,
bargain, sell, alien, enclose, convey and confirm, unto the said **Town of Kennebunk**,

a certain tract of land situated on South side of Western Avenue in the village of
Kennebunk, commencing about twenty-four feet Westerly from said house^{241 WESTERLY} Engine
House at an iron band on Western Avenue; thence southerly one hundred and
forty and one-half feet; thence westerly one hundred and thirty-eight feet to a
tree; thence northerly one hundred twenty and one half feet; thence by
and Avenue to place of beginning. Also giving to said town the right of way
between said Engine House and the above described lot.

This conveyance is made for the purpose of furnishing to the Town of Kennebunk
a site for the location of the Fletcher Free Library Building, and this
conveyance is made upon the express condition that whenever the same
shall cease to be used for that purpose, this deed shall become null and void
and the title to the land hereby conveyed shall revert to the grantor,
his heirs and assigns forever.

manner aforesaid; that the said premises are free and clear from all and every incumbrance whatsoever,
and that I, and my heirs, executors and administrators, shall and will warrant and defend the same to the said *John of
Henniker, as aforesaid.*

And I, *Louise M. Emerson*,
and
heirs and assigns, against the lawful claims and demands of any person or persons whomsoever,
wife of the said *Henry A. Emerson*,

in consideration aforesaid, do hereby relinquish my right of dower in the before mentioned premises.

And we and each of us do hereby release all rights of Homestead,
accrued to us, by either of us, by Chapter 138 of the Public
Statute of New Hampshire, or any other statute of said State.
